INCREASE IN 'SCAM' CALLS

Dear residents

I have been informed of recent reports of attempted fraud in East Hampshire. In

one particular case a 90-year-old Alton man received a call claiming to be from Hammersmith Police. The victim was told someone had been detained for using his bank card – the victim was advised to call back to check the caller's identity, but again this was a scam as the call was not actually terminated. The victim became annoyed and hung up – no bank details were exchanged during the phone call and no money was taken – others have not been so fortunate.

Another telephone scam involved a call to a Herriard man informing him his bank has a refund for him. Advised if he wished to claim the refund he was to press button 5 on his telephone and if he had received a refund he was to press button 9. I suspect that both may lead into very expensive calls and are NOT from any bank. Our resident did the right thing and just hung up.

In other cases victims have been told that there are fake bank notes in circulation that should be withdrawn for safe

keeping and forensic testing. We believe that in at least one case locally a victim has handed over money, after being told it needed to be forensically examined. A courier arrived at their home address.

A number of different male and female voices may be used as part of the scam; individuals may also try to deceive you by pretending to transfer you to a specific person. The callers often ask for victims to hand over their bank card and details to a courier or to attend a bank to withdraw cash. It is likely that they are using online phone directories, in which they can search age ranges as well as regions, to select their elderly victims. A number of calls proved that the caller had the home address of the victim. An identification or reference number may be also be offered or the victim may be prompted to enter a pin number into their handset. It's important to not do this or offer any information if you are not sure of the identity of the caller.

I can confirm that the Police would NEVER cold call and ask you to produce cash for an officer or a courier..

Hampshire Constabulary offers the following advice:

- Never give out personal information about your bank account to anybody over the phone.
- Never give out your PIN in any form
- If someone calls claiming to be a police officer, ask for their identification number and police force. Advise that you will call them back using the 101 number and hang up. Call back from a different phone if possible or wait at least 10 minutes to ensure they have not left the line open.
- If you have given information which could compromise your bank account security in any way, call your bank to cancel your cards as soon as possible.
- Never hand over money to someone at the door to be sent off elsewhere.
- If someone comes to your door claiming to be a police officer or staff member, always ask for identification and make a note of their identification number. Ask them to wait while you verify their identity. Close the door and call 101. Dial 999 if it is an emergency.

POLICE UPDATE

Dear Residents,

I am pleased to report that we have had only three reported crimes between July 16th and August 27th. These were an assault allegation in Nately Scures, a making off without paying a hotel bill also in Nately Scures and the theft of a blue plastic cray fish trap from the River Loddon in Andwell between 5pm on August 7th and 5pm on August 8th. If anyone can assist with any information please give me a call direct, as always all information is strictly confidential.

I also have received an alarming report of a fire fuelled BBQ being found in a field of standing corn. Obviously the implications of this are considerable, with the then dry weather and possible wind, fire in the field could have caused a major incident and put all around at risk. I ask residents not to venture onto private farmland for any reason and especially for BBQs or anything else involving fire.

On a similar note, I ask local residents to please report any sightings of men with lurcher dogs seen in the stubble fields. Sadly this time of year will see an increase in illegal hare coursing where dogs will be set to chase and often catch and kill hares in the fields. This act was made illegal in 1839 with the passing of the Game Act and re-informed with the Hunting Act. Please do not challenge these people simply call the Police and allow us to attend and hopefully catch them in the act.

Also I wish to make you aware of a crime increase within the northern Basingstoke rural area in and around Kingsclere, and Wootton Hill. We have seen several shed burglaries and similar thefts during the year, however, of late I have noticed that such crimes are gradually moving south with an increase reported in the Overton, Oakley, Sherbourne St John areas, my deepest concern is that the criminal element will be looking to focus on our area in due course and I again appeal to all residents to please make sure your sheds and outbuildings are secure and alarmed if possible. Please record serial numbers and take photographs of valuable items and please continue to report any suspicious people, vehicles or incidents.

Regarding the Police restructure, I understand that local representatives are, at the time of writing, still in talks with the Police & Crime Commissioner.

RESEARCHING FAMILY HISTORY...

'As Stan Foster's elder son I was interested to read the article on 'Researching Family History' in the August *Villager* [Greywell pages].

'The three brothers, Howard, Ralph and Edward, indeed established Fosters' Yard. Stan Foster and his older brother Gordon lived at Water End and were cousins of those three.

'Gordon farmed there until a dual carriageway was built through the farm buildings in the 1960s. Thereafter he spent some years as landlord of the Red Lion Inn (now the Y Knot), before retiring to Lyme Regis. He was also a gamekeeper and I can remember many Christmas period shoots enjoying a lovely warming meal half way through the day at the Greywell Fox & Goose (though these Fosters were no relation).

Stan was a keen cricketer. He was a founder member of Hook & Newnham Cricket Club, helping to carve the current King George V ground out of common land. From 1947 to the 1980s he was a pillar of the Club, fulfilling the roles of Groundsman, Captain, Secretary and Treasurer. Sometimes he occupied 2 or 3 of these roles at once, establishing the Club on a sound financial basis, including its resurrection after a fire in the 1970s. He received the Duke of Edinburgh's Torch Award for services to cricket.

'All the Fosters were keen cricketers. At one time in the 1970s, there were seven Fosters in the Hook first team!

'I'm afraid that we are no help to Pam Richards concerning her family history, but it is interesting that our families share the same surname.'

Proposed Solar Farm, Wildwood Farm, Old Basing

15/02465/ENSC (14th July 2015) Land at Wildwood Farm, Newnham Lane Old Basing. Request for screening opinion for a proposed solar farm

This application is from 'Lightsource Renewable Energy Ltd' requesting a 'screening option' to assess if an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) will be required to accompany a planning application for a proposed 'solar farm'.

The site is 14.08ha (36 acres) lying to the east of Old Basing and north of the railway line, largely enclosed – says the Basingstoke & Deane Planning Officer's report – by mature woodland belts and hedgerows.

The Case Officer concluded that an EIA will not be required as 'the development proposed is unlikely to have significant environmental impacts on the landscape character and visual amenity of the area'.

According to Lightsource the land will also be grazed by sheep thus keeping it in agricultural use.

The proposal is for 'Solar PV panels mounted on fixed metal frames (max height 2.5metres) – inverters – transformers – on-site switchgear substations – communications building – perimeter security 2m high and CCTV cameras – suitable access for construction.

Lightsource held a public consultation meeting on 18th August in Old Basing Village Hall.



It is apparent that the solar panels have to be delivered via one end of Newnham Lane or the other – see proposed routes map. 'Access during the construction period will be limited to 40ft containers and construction and use (C&U) vehicles.' Access from the east will bring the deliveries from M3 J5 via Old School Road and Newnham Road; the alternative is via Pyotts Hill, Great Binfields Road and the A33 and A339 back around to Black Dam and J6.

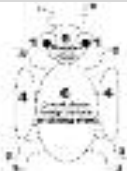

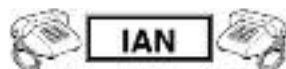

Thirty children aged from just two weeks up to about 10 years from the United Parish enjoyed a fun-packed day on Thursday 27th.

We gathered at 11 at St Swithun's and started our day at Miller's Ark where the children had great fun feeding the animals, holding and stroking the small furry ones and getting into the pens with the pigs, goats, donkeys and even the great big cart horse. After a ride on Loobie Loo we enjoyed a lovely cooked lunch from the Millers Ark kitchens. Next was a play time in the straw climbing over bales and swinging on the horse shaped swings. We then headed back to the church to hear the story of Noah and his ark and to sing some songs; having set the scene we built an ark and lots of animals, and painted a lovely mural to decorate the gallery. Next we let off steam during Noah's Olympics and a treasure hunt in the church yard. After tea we finished the day with a short prayer sitting on bales around the enormous ark built by Sam.

Dear Friends

Thank you so much for all your lovely comments and appreciation of last month's letter. My reflections on our holiday in the Scilly

Isles seem to have stirred up quite a lot of memories of your own holidays there over the years. It is certainly a very beautiful part of our country.

By the time you read this we will have had another week away, this time in Suffolk. Our younger daughter lives in Bury St Edmunds, so for part of the time we shall be staying with Lizzy and Paul and their menagerie (Hugo the cat and Hank the dog!) and also visiting some other friends who live nearby. But we are also going to base ourselves in Woodbridge for a few days to see a different part of that county. I have long wanted to walk along the beach at Aldeburgh that inspired Benjamin Britten to write so much of his music and we have also booked for a concert at Snape Maltings. And, although I am an Essex girl by birth, I have never visited Constable Country on the Essex/Suffolk border – so that is on our agenda too.

I am fascinated by etymology – the origins of our words – and I have been musing on the word 'holiday'. Today holidays are all about recreation and relaxation, and usually about seeking to do things that give us personal pleasure. But the word obviously derives from 'holy-day': a time when the festivals of the church determined when people should and should not be at work, a time for duty perhaps, a time for focussing on the holy, on God. But our modern idea of a good holiday fits much more closely with the American use of the word vacation, and similarly the French, les vacances. This is usually about freedom from duty, time for vacating or emptying one's life of all the usual routine, making room for leisure and enjoyment.

At first glance the use of these two different words might seem to be

contradictory – one only concerned with personal satisfaction, the other with looking to God. And yet it is only when we step away from all the things that tend to preoccupy our daily lives, whether that is work outside or within the home, family commitments, hobbies and the like, that we find the space and the time to get to know God around us and within us. And so both words come together as we need to take a vacation, away from it all, in order to have a truly God centred holy-day!

Which is not to say that God is not in all the little details and all the busy activity of our daily lives – of course he is. Every day is a holy day and every place is a holy place: we're just sometimes too busy to see God at work all around us or to feel his presence. I've been lucky with my time away this summer but even if you are staying at home, still carrying on with your usual routine, I would encourage you to find a few moments every day to stop and remember that God is with you and that he loves you. And that will be your own mini holy-day – everyday!
